Building For The Future

Six years ago the board of trustees of WDVR made a commitment to plan for the future; it had become painfully apparent that we were rapidly outgrowing the Old Sergeantsville Blacksmith Shop which is certainly comfortable, friendly and cozy with over 18-years of memories. However, we are suffering from meeting new technology requirements and other growing pains. At present WDVR operates from a studio and transmitter site both of which are leased.

We have just two studios, one needed exclusively for production work and the other serves as our only active on-air studio. As a result, a program shift change between shows at DVR results in approximately 2-minutes of something very reminiscent of a Marx Brother's movie.

Add to that, the fact that WDVR's studio is located on a small lot in a beautiful bucolic residential neighborhood where there isn't enough room, nor would we in good conscience, expose our neighbors to a sorely needed 3-meter satellite dish for audio news feeds.

So a decision had to be made. Should we seek to lease larger quarters and rebuild our studios from scratch in some high-rent office building or should we build. Well, that was a no-brainer, we decided to opt for a secure future by building a permanent home for WDVR and at the same time improve our signal coverage by raising our antenna.

Why is it more secure to own rather than rent? The answer is simple. Namely, it's almost impossible to effectively move a radio station's transmitter to another location. The transmitter location is

the only thing that is licensed at a radio station. And it is licensed to that exact second of latitude and longitude.

So, in 2003 we purchased 5.6 acres of land straddling Kingwood and Franklin Townships, just north of Route 12 on Pittstown Road where we plan to co-locate our new studio and a 180-foot transmission tower. A concept for the building was designed by Michael Burns, from Michael Burns Architects in Lambertville and the site plan was laid out by Van Cleef Engineering in Clinton. It has taken this long to clear most of the hurdles with both Townships and now what remains is the building phase, which includes meeting requirements for things like a septic system and well, and finding additional funding for the project.

This is an exciting time for WDVR. Having a site of our own brings many advantages that are impossible for us today. Things like dual on-air studios, new studio audio equipment, a recording studio and a live performance studio, which will include space to make WDVR a community asset. The antenna will be raised from 100 feet to 164 feet, and will now provide a stronger signal in those fringe areas. It's been a long hard struggle and in a sense after 5 years we have finally arrived at the beginning.

Although we will be moving from The Old Blacksmith Shop, the familiar sound of WDVR will still be there at 89.7, except it will be even better. As excited as we all are about this project, I suspect when that big day finally arrives to make the move, there'll be a tear or two as we close the door for the last time on almost 20-years of fond memories.

WDVR is live and local, a true community radio station. We were created to serve the public and consider it our privilege and responsibility to give back to the community.

One of the many ways we do this is through community based, educational talk shows, and over 22,000 community bulletin board and public service announcements each year.

WDVR's listening audience extends from Allentown, NJ to Allentown, PA and covers all of Hunterdon, Somerset, Mercer, Warren counties in New Jersey and all of Bucks, Montgomery, Lehigh, Northampton counties in Pennsylvania and around the world on wdvrfm.org.

Our listeners are mostly 35 plus. With about 4 million people in our listening area, and based on statistics, we believe we have about 40,000 to 50,000 listening at any particular time.

WDVR is diversified radio at its best with musical genres that include Country, bluegrass, celtic, folk, blues, jazz, big band, pop, etc. We also produce educational talk programs that include law, health, education, senior services and other subjects of interest to the community. And we are the only radio station on the East coast to produce a

live weekly country radio show before a live audience, Heartlands Hayride.

The station originates from Delaware Township, New Jersey with a power level of 5000 watts, and can be found at 89.7 on your FM dial with a translator station in Princeton at 91.9 FM. We also stream over the web at wdvrfm.org.

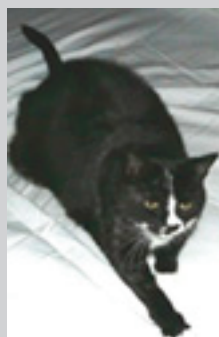

The New Jersey Forest And Fire Service

The New Jersey Forest Fire Service is administered by the Division of Parks and Forestry, New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection. The Forest Fire Service is staffed with 85 full-time employees and a large part-time force to provide wildland fire protection and management, as well as perform a variety of related functions.

The Service is under the direction of the state firewarden and a permanent staff with headquarters in Trenton.

The Forest Fire Service is responsible for protecting life and property from wildfire within 3.15 million acres of both private and public land statewide. The state is divided administratively into three divisions which

correspond to portions of north, south and central New Jersey.

Each division is administered by a division forest firewarden and the land is partitioned into sections of approximately 100,000 acres. A full-time forest firewarden is assigned to each section. There are twenty nine sections statewide. A section forest firewarden is responsible for all phases of fire prevention, pre-suppression and fire suppression within their assigned area.

Wildfires not only damage our woodlands, but are becoming an increasing threat to homeowners who live within or adjacent to forest environments and residents who utilize the state's great outdoors.

Much has been accomplished in

the battle against wildfires. However, there is still much to be done

In order to do a better job, the Forest Fire Service believes that it is necessary to let the public know the extent of the problem, how it affects them, and what needs to be done. It is important for the public to understand what the Forest Fire Service is responsible for, how it operates and serves them in the prevention and suppression of wildfires.

Like America's "Mom and Pop" stores, localism, has been vanishing from "Radio's Main Street". Just one of the benefit of "localism" to you is your ability to send us a community bulletin board message for an important event that is happening in your neighborhood, and have that message read over the airwaves many times prior to the event. Because of WDVR's willingness to "get the message out" many non-profit events have been extremely successful.

WDVR is a rare commodity. We're your neighbor; we operate live and we're right here on "Radio's Main Street". We cannot do it alone. Please add your voice by Making A Donation to WDVR.
